## *Workshop Registration*

## *Workshop Reimbursement Changes*

Please check with your school district Business Manager/ Board Secretary regarding the change in NJ State Law concerning reimbursement for attending workshops and meetings. Apparently, it is now a State Law requirement that a teacher be granted permission to obtain monies paid out of pocket by receiving approval of the Board of Education prior to attending the program. Therefore, you would have to seek the request for payment at a meeting of the Board in the month before the event.

The NJSC will be held at the Garden State Exhibit Center, Somerset, on Oct. 9-10. We will be making our presence felt again this year by having a booth with information relating to our activities and some items to give away.
